Norfolk County has many STRAY domestic cats!

Some "stray" cats are not strays but allowed outside to "play".

A few "stray" cats are just that ~they are lost and need to find their way home.

Many "stray" cats fend for themselves because owners have grown tired of them.

Too many "stray" cats are born outside. The offspring of these cats are know as *feral* and do not trust humans.

All of these stray cats can be stressed, scared, aggressive, or even dangerous as they are out of their *domestic* element.

Please leave them alone!

Many stray Cats are Feline AIDs (FIV), Feline Leukemia, and/or Distemper Positive which can be transmitted to your pets (NOT HUMANS) off your hands and clothing.

Parents, please teach your children to leave all stray animals alone as they may get injured or come into contact with disease or parasites.
